The Lord, the most mighty God has spoken and called the world from the rising of the sun to its setting. Out of Zion, perfect in beauty, God shines forth; our God comes and will not keep silence.' Psalm 50: 1 – 2

It has been my experience that the more commanding I try to appear, the more ridiculous I am. Imagining that my words alone carry weight, simply because I say them, is deluded. But not so for God. The Psalm set for today describes how God's spoke and called the whole world in to being, from the rising of the sun to its setting. God continues to work in the world, being present and active, he is not holed up in heaven, watching from a distance. And he continues to speak: the Psalmist wants us to know that the creative power of God is still transforming the created order. And this makes sense of our praying. As one writer said – by prayer we move the hand that moves the world. Perhaps our words can have more effect than I earlier said...

Almighty Lord and everlasting God, we beseech you to direct, sanctify and govern both our hearts and bodies in the ways of your laws and the works of your commandments; that through your most mighty protection, both here and ever, we may be preserved in body and soul; through our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.
